unless they give security (?) to leave  
the country within 30 days.

Immigration of Foreign Jews into  
Palestine.

No difficulties appear to have arisen in connection with this matter since 1893 - In that year stringent measures were imposed by the Ottoman authorities to prevent the entry of foreign Jews. This led to representations by most of the Powers, and on April 3, 1893 the Porte addressed a note to the Italian Embassy stating that its only object was to prevent the definitive establishment of foreign Jews in Palestine - the inference being that no interference with the rights of travellers was intended.
