Three hundred men from other sections of the same regiment, attended by a large force of Artillery.

They are commanded by a Colonel and two Bin Bashis.

This addition to the military resources of Jerusalem, at a time when the city is over-crowded with pilgrims, and more of them continually arriving, has served greatly to comfort the minds of the regular inhabitants with respect to the coming festival of Easter.

Our main apprehension is now, not from the expectation of fighting in the Sepulchre Church at that

time, so much as from the profuse of crowds which may give rise to accidents.

Kiamil Pasha still remains in the city.
